How to Make a Knitting Needle Bracelet

Knitting needle bracelets are a fun and unexpected fashion statement for crafty ladies or anyone who want to add a punch of color and whimsy to an outfit. Bangles like these are easy to make and do not take long, and if you have some extra knitting needles around, you should already have all the you need for a quick cute craft project!

Instructions

Difficulty: Moderately Easy

Things you'll need: plastic knitting needles, a large pot or pan, water, oven mitts, tongs, drinking glass, dishtowel

1. Place a glass upside down on a dish towel. The glass should be

as wide as you would like the bracelet to be. It may be easier to have a different glass for each bracelet you are making.

2. Add water to a pot or pan large enough to accommodate the knitting needles. Bring water to a boil.

3. Put one to three knitting needles in the boiling water for 2 – 3 minutes. Remove it from the water with tongs and test if it is soft enough to bend. If it is not soft enough, put it back in the boiling water for a minute at a time.

4. Using oven mitts or heat resistant gloves wrap the knitting needle around the glass. Let the bracelet cool while still wrapped around the glass to maintain the shape and also because it will still be hot.

5. Once the bracelet has cooled and hardened, which could be a

half hour to an hour or more, you can wear it and go! If you want to add some more personality to it, you can add charms onto the narrow end. Make it your own and be creative!

Tips:

Use an older pot and designate for non-food use. The knitting needles may leach chemicals into the pot that could be harmful.

Do not boil the needles too long as you do not want them to melt too much.

Once you have gotten the hang of making these, you could try softening two or more knitting needles at a time and twisting or braiding them together.

This project is not recommended for children, but makes a great gift for them.
